FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

"These things I have spoken to you, that in Me you may have peace. In the world you will have tribulation; but be of good cheer, I have overcome the world."

- John 16:33 (NKJV)

April means Easter is nearly upon us. Easter: Jesus' victory over the grave for those overcome by death. That means you. Jesus has overcome the grave for you. Death can't keep you in its grasp for Jesus has triumphed over the grave. We are those who even though we die, we will live. Our bodies that die will on the Last Day spring to life. Glorious, resurrected life.

On Maundy Thursday, before He had been arrested...put on trial...flogged...nailed to the cross...put to death: Jesus told His disciples, "Be of good cheer, I have overcome the world." In one sense, He hadn't yet. He hadn't yet died and risen in glory. But He would. That was the plan from the beginning...all the way back in the Garden, when Adam ate the forbidden fruit, it was told that the one born of woman would crush the head of the serpent (Genesis 3:15). Even though Jesus' victory over sin, death, and the devil hadn't been fully realized, it was "in the bag."

Jesus overcame the world. The same world that is crushing us on every side at this very moment has already been overcome by the Lord of life. I mean...sure...we may have COVID-19, economic depression, and widespread fear creeping in on us...closer and closer at every moment. But the battle...the *war* has been won. Jesus lives. Death is defeated. *Nothing* that comes at you in this world can undo what Jesus has already overcome.

Dear friends, as this Holy Week and Easter approaches us—a Holy Week and Easter unlike we've ever experienced—remember who you are. You are baptized into Christ. And He has overcome the world. He's overcome coronavirus. He's overcome whatever the markets do to your 401(k). He's overcome the panic that has overtaken so many other people. It won't overtake you. You are His. And He is yours. He is your Lord who has overcome the world.

It's a little uncertain what Holy Week and Easter 2020 will look like for our congregation. Our services may have to be held in unconventional ways. We may be participating in worship more and more via the screens of our phones and computers than we're comfortable with doing. We may be weeks and weeks from having taken part in the Table of Christ's Body and Blood.

This won't change: Jesus has overcome the world.

It's done. In His own words, "It is finished." (John 19:30)

What every congregation needs to know about domestic violence...

What is domestic violence? Domestic violence refers to a pattern of violent and coercive behavior exercised by one adult in an intimate relationship over another. It is not "marital conflict," "mutual abuse," "a lovers' quarrel." or "a private family matter." It may consist of repeated, severe beatings, or more subtle forms of abuse, including threats, and control.

Who are the victims of domestic violence? Statistics reflect that 95% of domestic violence victims are women, although men may also be victims. But regardless of who is being victimized, domestic violence is a serious problem that needs to be addressed by religious communities.

How prevalent is domestic violence? Surveys from the U.S. and Canada indicate that domestic violence occurs in 28% of all marriages. Researchers believe this estimate is too low since most domestic violence incidents are unreported.

What are the four basic types of domestic violence?

- Physical Assault Includes, shoving, pushing, restraining, hitting, or kicking. Physical assaults may occur frequently or infrequently, but in many cases they tend to escalate in severity and frequency over time
- Sexual Assault Any time one partner forces sexual acts which are unwanted or declined by the other partner.
- Psychological Assault Includes isolation from family and friends, forced financial dependence, verbal and emotional abuse, threats, intimidation, and control over where the partner can go and what she can do.
- Attacks Against Property and Pets Destruction of property which may include household objects of treasured objects belonging to the victim, hitting the walls, or abusing or killing beloved pets.

How do I know if someone is a victim of domestic violence? Women who are being battered are as different from each other as non-battered women. They come from all walks of life, all races, all educational backgrounds, and all religions. A battered woman might be the Vice-President of your local bank, you child's Sunday School teacher, your beautician or your dentist. Anyone experiencing any of the patterns of abuse listed above is a victim of domestic violence.

Why does she stay? She stays because she is terrified that he will become more violent if she leaves, that he will try to take the children, that she can't make I on her own.

What should I do if I believe I am a victim of domestic violence?

- Trust your instincts and seek help from a domestic violence program in your community.
- Recognize that the abuse is not your fault.
- Know that you are not alone and that help is available.
- Talk in confidence with someone you trust: a relative, a friend, or , if you feel comfortable, a religious leader.
- If you choose to remain in the situation for now, set up a safety plan of action (for example, hide a car key and some money in a safe place, locate somewhere to go in case of emergency).

Who are batterers? Just as with battered women, men who batter fall into no specific categories. They also come from all class backgrounds, races, religions, and walks of life. They may be unemployed or highly-paid professionals. The batterer may be a good provider, a sober and upstanding member of the community, and a respected member of his congregation.

How do I know if I'm a batterer?

- If you are extremely jealous,
- If you control your partner's activities,
- If you use physical force to solve problems, and
- If you believe that you are the head of the household and should not be challenged,
- then you are probably hurting the people you love and you should get help from someone who will hold you
 accountable. Acknowledge that the abuse is your problem and have the courage to seek help.

LCMS- Stewardship-Ministry-Newsletter Article—April 2020

On the topic of stewardship, one of the most common questions a person might ask is *not* whether a Christian should give to their church. Everyone knows this. Of course, Christians should give to their church.

The most common question: "How much should I give?" But what they really mean is this: "Should Christians give a tithe of their income to their local congregation?" So, let's look at why you should or should not tithe.

Following are some reasons often offered for why Christians *shouldn't* give a tithe to their church. Some say you shouldn't tithe because it isn't expressly commanded in the New Testament. Lacking

that command, there is no "Thus saith the Lord" and no "should" for giving a tithe to your congregation. Others say that Christians give to their congregation in ways much broader than money. They give

of their time and their talents, and these, together with treasures (money), add up to more than a tithe.

Still others say they give of their treasures to other things besides their congregation, and they want to support those things alongside their church.

And there are those who think Christians shouldn't tithe because of fear. If they tithe, they are afraid their gift will be misused, and they are afraid they won't have enough to get the things they use, want, or need.

Following are some reasons for why Christians should give a tithe to their church.

Even though the New Testament doesn't specifically command Christians to give a tithe, the Old Testament people were commanded to tithe and did. On top of this, St. Paul often describes the giving Christians are to do in similar terms as a tithe: a regular and generous proportion of the first fruits of their income (1 Cor. 6:1–2; 2 Cor. 8:7–23; 2 Cor. 9:2–7).

But here's another way to think about it. What was the point of the tithe in the Old Testament? Where did it go? The reason for the Old Testament tithe was to support the full ministry of the Levites. They were not given any land because they had no time to farm; their full-time job was the ministry.

What does it say in the New Testament? "The Lord has commanded that those who preach the Gospel should make their living from the Gospel" (1 Cor. 9:14). This is the verse that Luther put in the *Small Catechism*'s Table of Duties to cover what Christians owe to the support of the ministry.

It seems clear from both the Old and the New Testaments that the tithe is the goal of Christians in their giving. But what if we're not there yet? How should we handle this? What are we to do?

Let's answer this by asking a different question about something entirely different. What would you say to your adult children who only attended church quarterly or once a month? There, is after all, no passage in the New Testament that requires Christians to go to church weekly. Hebrews 10:25 is the closest we have, and it states simply for Christians to not neglect gathering together. Even though there is no passage that commands Christians to gather weekly, that is the implicit expectation throughout the Old and New Testaments. It is the goal.

So, what would you say to that son or daughter? I'd expect that conversation would be something like this: "I'm glad you're still going to church. It is a wonderful blessing to hear God's promises of forgiveness, life, and salvation, and to receive His gifts in the Word and the Sacraments. But you can do better, and it will only be a blessing to you. There is a better way, and I'd really like you to try to attain it."

This same conversation is how we should approach the topic of the tithe. It's not specifically commanded in the New Testament, but it sure seems like the implicit expectation of both the Old and New Testaments. So, the church is ecstatic that you're giving when you're giving in all these ways – time, talents, and treasures.
