From the Pastor's Desk

"Behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age."

- Matthew 28:20b (ESV)

As we prepare to reenter the house of the Lord ... to gather as His people once again before His altar (albeit with some very different practices in place), perhaps it's a good time to remind ourselves why it is that we gather in such a way. Some gather in churches because they feel that it's appropriate to acknowledge God at the start of the week and this sets thing off on the right foot. There are those who think that they should be there to offer the Lord the worship and praise that He is due; their gathering is a sacrifice that they offer to Him. Others gather together because they believe it will keep God's judgment at bay ... almost like a good-luck charm. Still others look at being in church as a social gathering, a place to be with like-minded people and to enjoy community with one another.

There are countless other reasons why people go to church on Sunday mornings and many of them have a kernel of truth to them. It *is* a good practice to start your week off in church. It *is* appropriate to offer God a sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. It *is* good to be together with fellow Christians. But none of those are at the heart of why we gather.

Before Jesus ascended into heaven, He made a promise to His disciples. He had commanded them to go out and "make disciples." He told them to do it by "baptizing" and "teaching." And as they went, He gave them this guarantee: "Behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age." (Matthew 28:20b, ESV) Through hatred ... government opposition ... contagious disease ... war ... persecution ... the early Church—and generations of it after—gathered together with the conviction that Jesus keeps His Word. He is with His Church. The Church gathers because Jesus has risen from the dead and remains with His Church.

Why do we gather? We gather because Jesus is with us. He's in the Word because He is the Word. He's with us in the Sacraments where the Word is joined to water ... or to bread and wine. We gather around these things because when everything is falling down around you, where else would you rather be than where Jesus is?

I want to thank you for your patient enduring with us over the past two months as we've navigated the COVID-19 pandemic. We will continue to do so with care for all those who enter our doors, as well as those who remain outside of them. Obviously, the Church can make no guarantees about the physical safety of its worshipers. We can take precautions. We can use sound judgment. But our lives are in the Lord's hands. But one thing we *can* guarantee: Jesus is with His Church. Jesus is with us. He continues to forgive by means of the blood that He shed for us. He continues to be with us in His Supper, as often as we gather to receive it. He continues to dwell in His Word, delivering to us all the promises of our heavenly Father.

It's good to be back! Thanks be to God, Jesus never left.

Health and Wellness Ministry

<u>What is high blood pressure?</u> High blood pressure (also referred to as HBP, or hypertension) is when your blood pressure, the force of blood flowing through your blood vessels, is consistently too high. If you have high blood pressure, you are not alone_nearly half of American adults have high blood pressure. (Many don't even know they have it.)

The best way to know if you have high blood pressure it is to have your blood pressure checked.

<u>Know your numbers</u> Learn about your blood pressure numbers and what they mean. High blood pressure is a "silent killer" Most of the time there are no obvious symptoms. Certain physical traits and lifestyle choices can put you at a greater risk for high blood pressure. When left untreated, the damage that high blood pressure does to your circulatory system is a significant contributing factor to heart attack, stroke and other health threats.

<u>Preventing and managing HBP</u> This is one time that the old adage, "An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure," is particularly apt. It's best to avoid high blood pressure altogether. Healthy lifestyle choices are a great place to start.

With proper treatment and management, you can control your blood pressure to help you live a long and healthy life. High blood pressure threatens your health and quality of life In most cases, the damage done by high blood pressure (HBP, or hypertension) takes place over time. Left undetected (or uncontrolled), high blood pressure can lead to:

<u>Heart attack</u> — High blood pressure damages arteries that can become blocked and prevent blood flow to the heart muscle. <u>Stroke</u> — High blood pressure can cause blood vessels in the brain to clog more easily or even burst.

<u>Heart failure</u> — The increased workload from high blood pressure can cause the heart to enlarge and fail to supply blood to the body.

<u>Kidney disease or failure</u> — High blood pressure can damage the arteries around the kidneys and interfere with their ability to filter blood effectively.

<u>Vision loss</u> — High blood pressure can strain or damage blood vessels in the eyes.

Sexual dysfunction — High blood pressure can lead to erectile dysfunction in men or lower libido in women.

<u>Angina</u> — Over time, high blood pressure can lead to heart disease or microvascular disease (MVD). Angina, or chest pain, is a common symptom.

<u>Peripheral artery disease (PAD)</u> — Atherosclerosis caused by high blood pressure can cause a narrowing of arteries in the legs, arms, stomach and head, causing pain or fatigue.

Can hypertension cause other problems?

When your blood pressure is too high for too long, it damages your blood vessels – and LDL (bad) cholesterol begins to accumulate along tears in your artery walls. This increases the workload of your circulatory system while decreasing its efficiency.

As a result, high blood pressure puts you at greater risk for developing life-changing and potentially life-threating conditions.

Your best protection is knowledge, management and prevention

<u>Know your numbers</u> — The best way to know if you have high blood pressure is to have your blood pressure checked. <u>Understand the symptoms and risks</u> — Learn what factors could make you more likely to develop high blood pressure and put you at risk for serious medical problems.

<u>Make changes that matter</u> — Take steps to reduce your risk and manage your blood pressure. Make heart-healthy lifestyle changes, take any medication as prescribed and work in partnership with your doctor.

High blood pressure and hypertensive crisis

If your blood pressure readings suddenly exceed 180/120 mm Hg, wait five minutes and then test your blood pressure again. If your readings are still unusually high, contact your doctor immediately. You could be experiencing a hypertensive crisis.



LCMS- Stewardship-Ministry-Newsletter Article—June 2020

The sin of the world is paid for. God's Law has been kept perfectly on our behalf. The prophecies have all been fulfilled. Jesus Christ has finished it all! And that, dear Christians, should fill us with complete confidence in our salvation. Since Jesus has finished all these things in His self-sacrifice, we can be fully certain our sins are forgiven, and we have everlasting life!

St. Paul wrote: "I appeal to you therefore, brothers, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual worship." (Rom. 12:1)

We hear the same teaching in 1 Peter. "As you come to him, a living stone, rejected by men but in the sight of God chosen and precious, you yourselves, like living stones, are being built up as a spiritual house, to be a holy priesthood, to offer spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ." (1 Peter 2:4-5)

It's the very thing Malachi foretold of the Lord, that He would come and purify His priestly people, that they may offer to Him an offering in righteousness. (Mal. 3:3)

So, what does this mean? In view of God's mercies – that is, because Jesus sacrificed Himself to make us pure, giving His entire self into death – Paul said that we are to sacrifice ourselves entirely to God, offering Him our whole lives. For our Savior did not give Himself for us in part. So, we do not give back to Him in part.

We don't offer ourselves to God just on Sunday mornings or Wednesday evenings, for example. Rather, we give Him our whole selves, all the time. We understand that offering ourselves to God as living sacrifices involves the giving of our time. It requires us to be faithful stewards of the time He has given us. Yes, it means we devote to our Savior all our time. Otherwise we are not sacrificing our whole lives.

You see, God both teaches us, and has graciously qualified us, to present ourselves to Him as living sacrifices – to live as His holy priests, who offer Him acceptable sacrifices through Jesus Christ, all day, every day, in our various callings.

In the passages from Romans and 1 Peter, we hear several examples of Christian self-sacrifice: serving, teaching, encouraging, giving, leading, showing mercy, living peaceably with others, submitting to governing authorities and those over us in the workplace, wives submitting to husbands, husbands honoring wives, showing compassion, and suffering patiently in doing good.

In all these things, and in all our other everyday activities, we sacrifice ourselves by using our time, not just for our own benefit, but also and especially for the well-being of others. Work time, school time, exercise time, study time, mealtime, chore time, recreation and relaxation time, even sleep time – it's all God's gift to us to use for purposes that please and honor Him.

This challenges us to think about the way we spend our time, how we utilize our talents, and the way we spend our treasures. Whatever it is I'm doing, am I doing it "for the Lord"? (Col. 3:23) Am I presenting God a living sacrifice? Am I conducting myself as a holy priest, whose sacrifice is acceptable to God?

Because our Lord sacrificed Himself wholly for us, we offer ourselves wholly to Him as living sacrifices. This is following Jesus in self-sacrifice. By His saving mercy, yes, our sacrifice is acceptable to God. For the sake of Jesus' finished work, God is pleased with us.
