From the Pastor's Desk

"And let us consider how to stir up one another to love and good works, not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day drawing near."

- Hebrews 10:24-25 (ESV)

There were a lot of "memes" and statements being shared on social media earlier this year as churches were closing down that said, "The Church Isn't a Building." The sentiment was that just because we can't gather together in one place, doesn't mean we stop being the Church. I agree with that sentiment. The Church is, according to Martin Luther, "sheep who hear the voice of their shepherd." (Smalcald Articles) As long as God's people are hearing the Shepherd, Jesus Christ, speak to them through His Word, the Church is alive and well.

That being said, the Church is meant to gather together to hear that Word and to receive the Lord's Supper. We found creative ways to do that during the statewide lockdown and as soon as it was possible, we reopened the doors to our building and resumed services. I think the thing that has warmed my heart the most since we restarted in-church services has been each week seeing someone return to the Divine Service for the first time. Seeing so many people who probably are at a greater risk than the vast majority of us come forward to receive what Jesus gives them is an encouragement: the type of which our verse speaks about above.

Some of us are still concerned. Or some of us may have just gotten out of the habit. The author to the Hebrews reminds us that Christians should "not [neglect] to meet together, as is the habit of some." The book of Hebrews connects our salvation in Jesus Christ to the worship of Israel in the tabernacle and the temple. Israel had a worship system based on sacrifices brought to the place where they were assured that God was present with them. Our worship isn't so different. The sacrifice of Jesus on the cross, once for all, is the assurance that God is with us. We come together before the altar because we know that our God who loves us is there with His gifts in Jesus Christ for us.

In this year of 2020, I've learned a lot about what it means to be the Church...what a joy it is to serve you, His people...and how painful it is to not be able to serve you with His gifts in all the ways I've been accustomed to doing. Seeing your faces on Sunday morning (or Wednesday evening) is the highlight of my week. Seeing a face that I haven't seen in months...or in some cases, even years...is a joy that I can't even begin to describe. We are doing everything we can to be smart about our gathering together. We are taking every precaution we can to protect the health and well-being of our members.

The one thing we can never stop doing is "meeting together." This, the author of Hebrews reminds us, is what the Church does as "the Day [draws] near." We usually think of the Last Day, the end of this world, as a bad thing...a scary thing. But the fact that Jesus will return on the Day of Judgment isn't bad news. It's the best news! God grant that we wouldn't cling to this world which seems to disappoint us more and more on a daily basis. Our hope isn't found in who wins in November or in the finding of a vaccine for COVID-19. Our hope is in the resurrection of Jesus Christ. He lives and He will come again to raise the dead and gather us into His heavenly kingdom. Let's "encourage one another" with this good news...this best news! The Church may not technically be a building...but what we do in our building is what God has called us, His Church, to be doing as we await our Lord's return!

Join us this Sunday! Your presence will "encourage" me and everyone else! And we will "encourage" you with the promises that are yours in Jesus...especially the promise that "the Day is drawing near!"

Health and Wellness Ministry

August

What is a cataract? A cataract is the clouding of the lens in the eye that affects vision. Most cataracts are related to aging. Cataracts are very common in older people. By age 80, more than half of all Americans have either a cataract or have had cataract surgery. A cataract can occur in either or both eyes. It cannot spread from one eye to the other.

What is the lens? The lens is a clear part of the eye that helps to focus light, or an image, on the retina. The retina is the light-sensitive tissue at the back of the eye. In a normal eye, light passes through the transparent lens to the retina. Once it reaches the retina, light is changed into nerve signals that are sent to the brain. The lens must be clear for the retina to receive a sharp image. If the lens is cloudy from a cataract, the image you see will be blurred.

Who is at risk for cataract? The risk of cataract increases as you get older. Other risk factors for cataract include: certain diseases (for example, diabetes); personal behavior (smoking, alcohol use); the environment (prolonged exposure to ultraviolet sunlight).

What are the symptoms of a cataract? The most common symptoms of a cataract are:

- Cloudy or blurry vision.
- Colors seem faded.
- Glare. Headlights, lamps, or sunlight may appear too bright. A halo may appear aroung lights.
- Poor night vision.
- Double vision or multiple images in one eye. (This symptom may clear as the cataract gets larger.)
- Frequent prescription changes in your eyeglasses or contact lenses.

These symptoms also can be a sign of other eye problems. If you have any of there symptoms, check with your eye care professional.

How is a cataract detected? A cataract is detected through a comprehensive eye exam that includes:

- Visual acuity test. This eye chart test measures how well you see at various distances.
- Dilated eye exams. Drops are placed in your eyes to widen, or dilate, the pupils. Your eye care professional uses a special magnifying lens to examine your retina and optic nerve for signs of damage and other eye problems. After the exam, your close-up vision may remain blurred for several hours.
- Tonometry. An instrument measures the pressure inside the eye. Numbing drops may be applied to your eye for this test.

How is a cataract treated? The symptoms of early cataract may be improved with new eyeglasses, brighter lighting, anti-glare sunglasses, or magnifying lenses. If these measures do not help, surgery is the only effective treatment. Surgery involves removing the cloudy lens and replacing it with an artificial lens. A cataract nees to be removed only when vision loss interferes with your everyday activities, such as driving, reading, or watching TV. You and your eye care professional can make this decision together. Once you understand the benefits and risks of surgery, you can make an informed decision about whether cataract surgery is right for you. In most cases, delaying cataract surgery will not cause long-term damage to your eye or make the surgery more difficult. You do not have to rush into surgery. If you have cataract in both eyes that require surgery, the surgery will be performed on each eye at separate times, usually 4 to 8 weeks apart.

Is cataract surgery effective? Cataract removal is one of the most common operations performed in the United States. It also is one of the safest and most effective typed of surgery. In about 90% of cases, people who have cataract surgery have better vision afterward.

What are the risks of cataract surgery? As with any surgery, cataract surgery poses risks, such as infection and bleeding. Before cataract surgery, your doctor may ask you to temporarily stop taking certain medications that increase the risk of bleeding during surgery. After surgery, you must keep your eye clean, wash your hands before touching your eye, and use the prescribed medications to help minimize the risk of infection. Serious infection can result in loss of vision. Cataract surgery slightly increases you risk of retinal detachment. Other disorders, such as high myopia (nearsightedness), can further increase your risk of retinal detachment after cataract surgery. One sigh of a retinal detachment is a sudden increase in flashes of floaters. Floaters are little cobwebs or specks that seem to float about in your field of vision. If you notice a sudden increase in floaters or flashes, see an eye care professional immediately. A retinal detachment causes no pain.

It shifts our focus from asking "How can I be a friend, family member, neighbor, and servant to others?" to "What have they done for me lately?" We become more selfish instead of selfless.

But, when we give, we do not have less, and we do not become less. We have more and become more. Because when we give, we join in the bond of friendship and family, the bond of service to those around us out of love for them. And love is the fulfillment of the Law. It is the nature of God Himself, for God is Love. Thus, we are participating in the divine nature. As Jesus said, "It is more blessed to give than to receive" (Acts 20:35).
