From the Pastor's Desk

"But we do not want you to be uninformed, brothers, about those who are asleep, that you may not grieve as others do who have no hope. For since we believe that Jesus died and rose again, even so, through Jesus, God will bring with him those who have fallen asleep. For this we declare to you by a word from the Lord, that we who are alive, who are left until the coming of the Lord, will not precede those who have fallen asleep. For the Lord himself will descend from heaven with a cry of command, with the voice of an archangel, and with the sound of the trumpet of God. And the dead in Christ will rise first. Then we who are alive, who are left, will be caught up together with them in the clouds to meet the Lord in the air, and so we will always be with the Lord. Therefore encourage one another with these words."

- 1 Thessalonians 4:13-18 (ESV)

Easter is the answer to fear.

The apostles—especially St. Paul—were known for their commitment to proclaiming that Jesus Christ was risen from the dead. The hope of the resurrection resounds throughout Paul's letters. It was the certainty that Jesus was living that compelled the apostles to spread the Gospel throughout the ancient world. The Church has carried on their task, preaching the forgiveness of sins and the promise of eternal life in Christ our Lord.

No matter what obstacles the world and the devil puts in front of the Church, we carry on with that message: Jesus Christ is risen from the dead. Paul quotes the prophets Isaiah and Hosea in 1 Corinthians 15 when he says, "Death is swallowed up in victory." 'O death, where is your victory? O death, where is your sting?' (1 Cor. 15:54-55, ESV) Paul doesn't only find the answer to fear in Jesus' resurrection. He even *taunts* death. Jesus being risen from the grave means that death is *a loser*. Death is *powerless*.

There have been many things in recent memory that have been trying to get us to cave in to fear. But that's nothing new. There have always been threats to our health...threats to our well-being...threats to our survival.

The Church gathers on Easter—and all throughout the year—to "thumb our noses" at death and Satan. We eat the body and drink the blood of our risen Lord because we know that in the Lord's Supper He comes to us and shepherds us "through the valley of the shadow of death." (Psalm 23:4)

This Easter, let us give thanks to God that fear and death are undone in the One who conquered over the grave. Let us give thanks to God that because Jesus lives, we will live. Let us feast on His holy Meal where we are strengthened against the assaults of the devil. And let us heed the words of St. Paul and continue to "encourage one another with these words" (1 Thessalonians 4:18) that Christ is risen...risen indeed!

Health and Wellness Ministry

April

April is national child abuse prevention month. Child abuse is when a parent or caregiver, whether through action or failing to act, causes injury, death, emotional harm or risk of serious harm to a child. There are many forms of child maltreatment, including neglect, physical abuse, sexual abuse, exploitation and emotional abuse.

Who does it happen to? A child of any age, sex, race, religion, and socioeconomic background can fall victim to child abuse and neglect.

Four types of abuse:

- 1. Physical abuse** Physical child abuse is the non-accidental infliction of physical injury to a child. Characterized by injury, such as bruises, lesions and fractures that result from hitting (hand, stick, strap, or other object), punching, shaking, kicking, beating, choking, burning (with open flame or hot objects – boiling water, cigarettes), throwing, stabbing or otherwise harming a child. The parent or caretaker need not have intended to hurt the child for it to constitute physical abuse
- 2. Sexual child abuse** (Rape, molestation, child pornography production and possession of child pornography) Most sexual abuse (90%) is incest perpetrated by a family member or someone the child knows, including those in biological families, adoptive families, and stepfamilies. Strangers account for 10% of sexual abuse. Incest most often occurs within a father-daughter relationship; however, mother-son, father-son, and sibling-sibling incest also occurs. Sexual child abusers can be: fathers, mothers, siblings, relatives, friends, childcare professionals, babysitters, teachers, clergy, athletic coaches, foster-parents, neighbors, and strangers
- 3. Neglect** is a pattern of failing to provide for a child's basic needs. It is abuse through omission; of not doing something resulting in significant harm or risk of significant harm.
- 4. Emotional abuse** (Aka: verbal abuse, mental abuse, and psychological maltreatment) Emotional child abuse is any attitude, behavior, or failure to act that interferes with a child's mental health or social development. A repeated pattern of caregiver behavior or extreme incident(s) that convey to children that they are worthless, flawed, unloved, unwanted, endangered, or only of value in meeting another's needs.

There are four types of neglect:

- 1. Physical neglect:** Failure to provide food, weather appropriate clothing, supervision, a safe and clean home.
- 2. Medical neglect:** Failure to provide the necessary medical or dental care for a child's condition.
- 3. Educational neglect:** Failure to enroll a school-age child in school or to provide necessary special education. Allowing excessive absences from school.
- 4. Emotional neglect:** Failure to provide emotional support, love, and affection to a child. Exposure of a child to spousal, pet, or drug and alcohol abuse.

What Are the Signs?

There are some simple signs you can look for that will help you spot child abuse. The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' Child Welfare Information Gateway gives these tips to look for:

Does the child seem like he or she is always looking for something bad to happen? Is he passive or overly compliant? Has she had a sudden change in behavior? Does the parent blame the child for most of their problems? Asks for harsh physical discipline when their child misbehaves? When the child and parent are together, are they separated and don't look at each other?

These may be signs that abuse is present. There are also specific red flags to look for when abuse is suspected.

- 1. Physical** A child may have unexplained injuries, doesn't want to leave to go home, or is frightened of other parents.
- 2. Neglect** A child steals food or begs for more, isn't wearing appropriate clothing for the weather, or is always dirty and has a strong body odor.
- 3. Sexual** A child has difficulty walking or sitting, experiences sudden changes in their appetite, or may demonstrate unusual or sophisticated sexual knowledge.
- 4. Emotional** A child demonstrates extreme emotional behaviors (super aggressive or overly passive), acts too mature or too childish, or does not show any attachment to their caretaker.

What Can I Do? If you suspect abuse has already occurred, make sure to report it. Most states have their own numbers to call, and Childhelp USA has a national Child Abuse Hotline that operates 24/7 (1.800.4.A.CHILD).



LCMS- Stewardship-Ministry-Newsletter Article—April

Our Father in heaven sent His Son, Jesus, to be our Savior. His atoning sacrifice is the first fruits of all the dead, a pleasing aroma to His Father, so that His perfect life and death count for all who believe in Him. He claimed us as His own children in Holy Baptism. He sustains and strengthens our faith with His Holy Word and His Body and Blood.

As new creatures, who have put on Christ, we bear good fruit. We do the good works prepared for us, which He makes known to us in His Word. By faith then, trusting in the Word of God, we do what he says because He does not lie and always keeps His promises. For “without faith it is impossible to please God, because anyone who comes to him must believe that he exists and that he rewards those who earnestly seek him” (Heb. 11:6).

And so the Lord promises: “Honor the Lord with your wealth and with the first fruits of all your produce; then your barns will be filled with plenty, and your vats will be bursting with wine” (Prov. 3:9-10). How do we honor the Lord with the wealth that God has given us in His generosity? By giving generously to those whom the Lord has called us to love and support your family, your society, and your church. And His promise is that, in so doing, you will never lack.

A common counterpoint is: “But that’s from the Old Testament!” Our Lord Jesus Himself gives us similar promises in the New Testament. He says, at the conclusion of the parable of the talents: “For to everyone who has will more be given, and he will have an abundance” (Matt. 25:29).

And then at the end of the parable of the dishonest manager, he says: “One who is faithful in a very little is also faithful in much, and one who is dishonest in a very little is also dishonest in much. If then you have not been faithful in the unrighteous wealth, who will entrust to you the true riches? And if you have not been faithful in that which is another’s, who will give you that which is your own? No servant can serve two masters, for either he will hate the one and love the other, or he will be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and money” (Luke 16:10–13).

And in His sermon on the mount, he says: “Do not lay up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust destroy and where thieves break in and steal, but lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust destroys and where thieves do not break in and steal. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also” (Matt. 6:19–21).

We have become conditioned against these promises because of their misuse by the peddlers of the prosperity gospel – the guys on TV who say you get rich by putting God in your debt. And thus, we miss out on the fact that God does reward temporal faithfulness in temporal matters with temporal blessings. It’s no quid pro quo. It’s all from God’s grace and His fatherly divine goodness and mercy. But those Bible passages do in fact say what they say! It’s not the Old Testament’s problem. It’s ours. It is almost as if we have become so jaded against this that we think it a virtue to be stingy with our offerings.

But our Father in heaven still loves to bless those who bless others. He loves to give to those who give freely and generously. In fact, he challenges us to challenge Him: “Bring the full tithe into the storehouse, that there may be food in my house. And thereby put me to the test, says the Lord of hosts, if I will not open the windows of heaven for you and pour down for you a blessing until there is no more need” (Mal. 3:10).

And so, while we don’t give so that we would get, we do receive from the Lord in order to give, and He will bless your giving with more receiving. As St. Paul wrote in Rom. 8:32: “He who did not spare his own Son but gave him up for us all, how will he not also with him graciously give us all things?”
