From the Pastor's Desk

"So Paul, standing in the midst of the Areopagus, said: 'Men of Athens, I perceive that in every way you are very religious. For as I passed along and observed the objects of your worship, I found also an altar with this inscription: "To the unknown god." What therefore you worship as unknown, this I proclaim to you."

- Acts 17:22-23 (ESV)

I've heard it said numerous times that pastors should never, ever, ever preach about politics. And I've had people tell me that if the preacher started talking about politics from the pulpit, that would be cause to leave the church and never come back. We are told routinely that, along with religion, we are never to talk about politics in casual conversation.

Why is that? Obviously, we as Christians do believe that religion should be a topic of conversation. We believe that Jesus has risen from the dead and we want to proclaim that good news. Should we be talking about politics as well? I would argue that it's impossible to avoid politics and that there is a godly way for us to engage it in conversation.

The Greek word that the New Testament uses for 'city' is *polis*. Think of city names like Minnea*polis*, Indiana*polis*, or Anna*polis*. A *polis* is simply a place where people are gathered together. A number of other English words come from this Greek word. The rules that those gathered people make to govern how they live are called *policies*. The authority that keeps people in the *polis* following the *policies* is the *police*. And the process of ordering how life will be lived together in the *polis* is called *politics*. What this means is that wherever people are gathered together and make decisions about how they will live in that place, there will be *politics*. It's unavoidable.

There are politics in the Church...and that's not a bad thing. It's a necessary thing. Sure, sinful people will do evil things with it. But that doesn't make the concept of politics a bad thing itself. We as a congregation are a gathering of people (*polis*) who have rules that govern our body (*policies*) with a council and boards that carry out the rules (*police*) and we gather together to decide how best to do those things in a godly manner (*politics*).

There are many things being discussed in our culture right now that will have a profound impact on the way that we live together as a people. It's easy and clichéd to say that the Church should "stay out of politics." But a more important question to ask is, "Should the Church be involved in the discussion of how we live together in our world?" If the answer to that question is "yes" (and it is), then we should be ready to join the fray.

On Thursday mornings, we've been studying the book of Acts, where we've looked at how the first Christians engaged the culture with the Gospel of Jesus Christ. In the verse quoted above, St. Paul went to a public forum called "the Areopagus" or "Mars Hill." There the locals would gather to discuss philosophy, politics, and spirituality. Paul brought the Gospel to that place and proclaimed Jesus as risen from the dead.

Starting on Sunday, June 6th, during our Sunday Bible study hour at 10:30 A.M., we will begin a series called "Christians and Culture." Each week, we will look at an issue facing our culture and discussing how Christians respond from a Biblical worldview. We'll look at things like critical race theory, Congress' proposed "Equality Act," transgenderism, pandemic lockdowns of churches, issues in our public schools, and so much more. I truly hope you'll join us and engage the discussion of how we, the people of God in this place, are to live together and interact together according to God's holy will!

NATIONAL SAFETY MONTH

Each week throughout National Safety Month in June is an opportunity to make a difference in your home, work, and community. Identifying risks around the home or improving safety standards at home and in your community protects everyone. Whether we increase first aid and emergency awareness through drills or provide water safety tips for summer recreation, we're taking steps to provide a safer neighborhood.

HOW TO OBSERVE #NationalSafetyMonth - Get involved!

- Report repairs as they are needed
- Hold drills at home to help children know what to do in the event of fire, tornado, medical event, or another natural disaster
- Volunteer to participate in community emergency preparedness events
- Put together a first aid kit
- Take a CPR class
- Teach someone to change a tire properly and safely
- Learn about proper storage and disposal of medications
- Take a defensive driving course
- Learn how to identify fall hazards in a home

5 Summer Safety Tips

- 1. Stay Hydrated Dehydration is another safety concern during the summer months. Be sure to drink enough liquids throughout the day, as our bodies can lose a lot of water through perspiration when it gets hot out.
- 2. Protect Your Skin Use a sunscreen 30 minutes before going out. Reapply sunscreen every two hours or after swimming or sweating. Limit sun exposure during the peak intensity hours between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. Stay in the shade whenever possible.
- 3. Water Safety Remember to always have adult supervision for children. Whether they're in the pool or playing in the sand at the seashore, having someone who can help them should an emergency arise is essential.
- 4. Eye Safety The sun's ultraviolet (UV) light can harm the eyes. Wear sunglasses year-round whenever you are out in the sun. Sun damage to the eyes can occur any time of year. Choose shades that block 99 to 100 percent of both UVA and UVB light.
- 5. Sports Safety Not only can injuries happen, but in heat exhaustion and dehydration can happen more often in the summer months. It helps to be conditioned to the activities in which we're preparing to engage. Warm up, stretch, gear up, go with a buddy, and remember to cool down and stretch afterwards.

There are several heat-related illnesses to look out for.

Heat Stroke - Heat stroke occurs when the ability to sweat fails and body temperature rises to a dangerous level quickly. It's often fatal or results in organ damage. Someone experiencing heatstroke will have very hot skin and an altered mental state. Seizures can result. Ridding the body of excess heat is crucial.

Heat Exhaustion - When the body loses an excessive amount of salt and water, heat exhaustion sets in. People who work outdoors and athletes are very susceptible. Symptoms are similar to the flu, and include severe thirst, fatigue, headache, nausea, vomiting and, sometimes, diarrhea. They may also have clammy or pale skin, dizziness, or rapid pulse.

Heat Cramps - Heat cramps are muscle spasms usually affecting the legs or abdominals, often after physical activity. Excessive sweating reduces salt levels in the body, resulting in heat cramps. Persons with pain or spasms in the abdomen, arms or legs should not return to work for a few hours.



LCMS- Stewardship-Ministry-Newsletter Article—June

"There are three conversions necessary to every man: the head, the heart, and the purse." Attributed to Luther, though yet to be located in his vast writings, this statement echoes what Jesus taught about hearts and treasures. He said, "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also." (Matthew 6:21; Luke 12:34)

But which conversion comes first? I submit that the order is this: first the head, then the purse, then the heart. Let's explore this topic.

Our Lord Jesus Christ dwelt among us to save us. He took on our flesh, fulfilled the demands of the law in our place, became sin for us, and suffered torture and death on our behalf. He did this in order that we would be free from sin, death, and hell. He gives us what He accomplished through Baptism, Absolution, and the Lord's Supper. And so, He doesn't just do it for us but gives it to us. He makes what He did ours by making us His. Thus, we are called by His name: Christians. We have a new life in Him.

Through the preaching of Law and Gospel, God grants us repentance, a changing of our minds. It is a conversion of the mind. We are called to turn away from our sins and turn toward Him for forgiveness, life, and salvation. For when God calls us away from something, He is, at the same time, calling us to something.

And thus, He calls us to a new life, with new deeds. This is the conversion of the purse. Jesus said that "it is easier for a camel to enter through the eye of a needle than for a rich person to enter the kingdom of God." (Matthew 19:24) "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also." Notice that our hearts follow our treasures, not the other way around. As Christians, God calls us to invest our treasures in His Kingdom to ensure that the gospel is preached and the sacraments are administered. He calls us to share all good things with the one who teaches us the doctrines of Christ. He calls us to be generous in giving to the church, for it is more blessed to give than to receive.

So where is your treasure? If it is not invested in the kingdom of God, then the only response is repentance – a conversion of the heart – and to begin doing just that. And as our Lord promised, where your treasure is there your heart will be also.

This is not to say that you earn your way into heaven. It is simply to say that as Christians, those who have been made to be temples of the Holy Spirit, who have been given a new life in Christ, who are dead to sin and now alive in Him, we are actually to live – think (conversion of the mind), do (conversion of the purse), and be (conversion of the heart) – a new life in Him. And when you fail, know that God in Christ loves and forgives you and still calls you away from that and to Himself.
