From the Pastor's Desk

"Lord, now you are letting your servant depart in peace, according to your word; for my eyes have seen your salvation that you have prepared in the presence of all peoples, a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and for glory to your people Israel."

- Luke 2:29-32 (ESV)

The Lutheran liturgy is filled with all sorts of beautiful Latin and Greek names. Though we followed the Blessed Doctor Martin Luther's lead and we sing the liturgy in the language of the people, there are several beautiful words that we find in our service: *Kyrie* is the Greek word for "Lord." When we sing the Kyrie, we sing, "Lord, have mercy upon us; Christ, have mercy upon us; Lord, have mercy upon us." *Gloria in Excelsis* is the Latin translation of "Glory to God in the highest."

Each Sunday, after the congregation has received the Lord's Supper, we sing the *Nunc Dimittis*. This Latin phrase means "now depart." It's the title of the Song of Simeon in Luke 2. After the infant Jesus has been brought to the temple in Jerusalem by His earthly parents, the old man Simeon was able to take this "little Lord" into his own hands. God was fulfilling a promise to Simeon that he would not depart this world until he had seen the Messiah of God's people with his very own eyes. Simeon sang that he could "now depart in peace" because he had seen…even held with his hands…the Savior of the world.

The Lutheran Church in her earliest days saw a connection between what Simeon held in his hands and what is placed into our hands and mouths in the Lord's Supper. It is Jesus Christ Himself who is given to us in the body and blood: the very same Lord who Simeon held. With this Christ, Simeon had the confidence to "now depart"...to die and enter his eternal rest with the peace that only the Lord God can give.

Similarly, we sing Simeon's song. We depart the church to go back to our lives and our vocations with the peace that only God can give. Though unlike Simeon, we "depart" to return to our lives, we have the same confidence that he had; when it is time to depart this life, we have the peace of knowing that the Messiah of God's people has come to save them.

How does peace sound to you? Do you think we have a need for peace in our world today? Could you use more of it yourself? Peace is found in the One who took on our humanity to be our Savior. Peace is found in the One whose body and blood are given in bread and wine. Peace is there for those who come to receive their Lord and join in Simeon's song.

Lord, grant us peace as You gave it to Simeon in our receiving of the Holy Supper!


Board of Missions

Have you been saving grocery slips? Have you been turning them into Our Redeemer? There is a large white bucket under the LWML card table labeled for Econo/Super One slips. We receive 1% of each \$1.00 you spend on groceries through their rebate programs. Sherry C. has graciously been tallying them up. The money goes into the Youth Program checking account. We use the money to sponsor our Compassion Child which is \$480 a year. There is also a container for stamps & ink cartridges however, they only accept Inkjets (they DO NOT accept Laser/Toner cartridges). Your support is greatly appreciated. We no longer take Campbells soup labels as Campbells has discontinued its labels for education program.

STAMPS FOR MISSIONS

Our Lutheran women's Missionary League began collecting used postage stamps in 1993 when The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod office in St. Louis, Missouri, ended this project. Our North Wisconsin District has worked with many different gentlemen over the years to sell our stamps. We are currently taking our stamps to a gentleman in Green Bay.

Our stamps were sold five different times in 1994 and the total amount sold to help support our missions was \$345.49. The year-to-date total now is \$13,897.66 Praise God from whom all blessings flow!

Dementia People with dementia, begin to forget things and have problems doing everyday tasks. Here is what you can do to help yourself.

• Get regular checkups and take your medications as prescribed.

- Eat healthy foods and try to exercise every day.
- Rest when you are tired.
- Drink less alcohol.
- Join a support group. The Alzheimer's Association can help.
- Do the activities you like as long as you are able to.
- Have a plan for emergencies or call 911.

Ask your doctor what medicines may help slow down the dementia.

Ask your doctor about day programs that keep you active.

Call your doctor it there are big changes in how you are acting or what you are thinking.

Contact the Alzheimer's Association Safe Return to get an ID bracelet at 1-888-572-8566.

Caregivers Taking care of people with dementia is hard. Here is what you can do.

- Always address the person by name.
- Create a daily routine by waking up, bathing, dressing, eating and going to bed at the same time each day.
- Use Velcro closures on clothing. They are easier than buttons and zippers.
- Create a safe and supportive home. Limit access to dangerous places. Have an even level of light in hallways and nonskid strips in the bathroom.
- Have a list of emergency phone numbers.
- Ask the doctor what stage the patient is in and what to expect.

Ask the doctor if all tests were done to be sure dementia is no caused by something that can be fixed or reversed. Ask the doctor about the medical care.

Ask the doctor what medicines to give and how to give medicines.

Ask the doctor about planning for the future, and of life decisions and hospice care.

Call the doctor if there are big changes in how the person is acting or thinking.

Opioid-induced Constipation Some pain medicines can make you constipated. Being constipated is when you only have a bowel movement (BM) about 2 times a week. Here's what you can do to help your constipation.

- Drink at least 8 glasses of water every day.
- Do not eat foods with a lot of fat.
- Do not eat foods with a lot of sugar.
- Walk or exercise at least 30 minutes a day.
- When you get the urge Go!
- Don't hold it until you get home.

Call your doctor right away if you have diarrhea, feel confused, still can't move your bowels, have stomach pain, or have nausea and vomiting.

Eat 25-30 grams of fiber every day. How much is that?

Food How much fiber?

Black beans 1 cup has 15 grams of fiber

All Bran cereal 1/2 cup has 10 grams of fiber

Corn 1 cup has 4 grams of fiber

Oatmeal 1 cup has 4 grams of fiber

Banana 1 medium has 3 grams of fiber

Whole wheat bread 1 slice has 2 grams of fiber

Ask your doctor what medicines may help you make a bowel movement.

Things to ask your doctor about constipation:

- How serious is constipation?
- What medicines can I take to move my bowels?
- What are the side effects of medicines that help me move my bowels?
- Is it safe to use a laxative from the drugstore to help move my bowels?
- Will the constipation go away on its' own?
- Will the constipation keep coming back?



LCMS- Stewardship-Ministry-Newsletter Article—July

"For freedom Christ has set us free; stand firm therefore, and do not submit again to a yoke of slavery" (Galatians 5:1).

We celebrate this month because of the freedoms and liberties our country has afforded us. We are right to do this. We should be thankful for these liberties – the freedom to gather together to worship and to live out what believe in our daily lives.

But freedom and liberty in our age have devolved. It has become a freedom from duty instead of a freedom for it. Indeed, freedom and liberty in our age has turned into licentiousness – a license to do what we want, when we want. This license is a submission again to a yoke of slavery. For freedom as license to do what we desire when we desire it means we are slaves to our desires and slaves to our passions.

Christ died to set us free from our desires. In Holy Baptism, our Old Adam is drowned and put to death along with all sin and evil desires so that a new man may arise and live before God in righteousness and purity. In Christ, we are a new creation. We are set free from the passions of the flesh so that we are free to do our duty and bear fruits of the Spirit.

Our duty is what God calls us to do as members of a family, society, and the Church. God calls us to believe in His Word and gladly hear and learn it. He calls us to pray for all people. He calls us to live in faith toward Him and in fervent love for our neighbor. He calls us to put the gifts He gives to us in His service. God calls parents provide for their children and raise them in the fear and admonition of the Lord.

And God calls children to honor their parents and provide and care for them when they are no longer able to do so themselves. God calls the government to punish those who do evil and to reward those who do good. He calls citizens to pay their taxes and honor the governing officials as God's servants. He calls pastors to preach and teach the Gospel, repentance for the forgiveness of sins. And He calls hearers to support those who teach them with every good thing.


Anniversary Prayer
